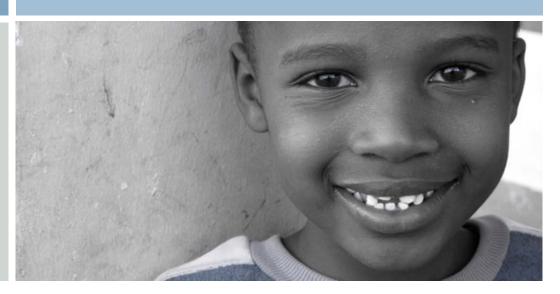

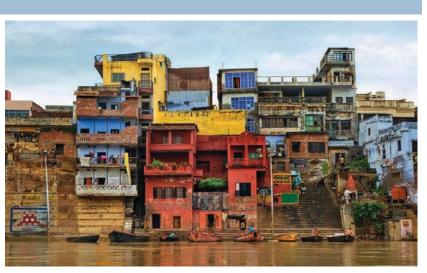

# ASAP Initiatives

#### Influencing the post-MDG agenda

ASAP is building scholarly consensus on what should replace the MDGs when they expire in 2015 and campaigning to put those goals on the UN agenda.

#### Know Your Rights India

ASAP is building web-based tools that will help improve access to information for people in India about government entitlements and how to claim them.

#### **Impact: Global Poverty**

#### Curbing illicit financial flows
